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1 Safety Instructions

Danger to life, risk of injury and damage to material or property.

Read the Operating Instructions carefully before initial operation. Observe general safety precautions as well as those included in various sections of these Operating Instructions.

Hazard risks:

- non-observance of the Operating and Safety Instructions
- modifications to the device by the customer
- handling the device outside the specified operating conditions
- handling the sensors outside the specified operating conditions
- use of unsuitable power supplies and peripheral devices
- improper use of the equipment

Danger when installing the sensors in pressurized pipelines:

- sensors for use in pressurized pipelines are to be inserted or retracted in depressurized conditions only; non-observance may result in serious injuries to personnel
- when installing or removing under pressure, the appropriate protective equipment must be used, e.g. ball valve and probe guide pieces with chain guard or spindle probe guide pieces

The pipes for the measurement gases must be insolated in a way that is ensured that the electronics housing of the apparatus does not assume a higher temperature than the aforementioned maximum ambient temperature. The radiant heat and convection heat has to be considered also.


- pay special attention to the mains voltage when using voltage converters
- when operating outdoors, make sure that the housing cover and the cable gland are screwed tight to the housing, otherwise the degree of protection IP65 is not guaranteed.





Wiring diagram transducer U10b with 2 analog outputs








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3.2 Status LEDs

The device is equipped with two status LEDs which indicate the status of the device independently of the optionally-available display or the WiFi module.

3.3 Parameter settings

Parameters can be set via the optional display and operation module (see chapter 4), as well as with the optional WiFi module or via M-Bus (see chapter 4.6.2).

M-Bus-Communication parameter: 2400 baud (adjustable) / even parity / 8 data bits / 1 stop-bit / no flow control

The M-Bus-Gateway must be able to allow communication outside the M-Bus protocol. Information regarding the function of your gateway can be received from the respective manufacturer.




4 Display and Operating Module

The functionalities described in this chapter are for units fitted with display and operating module, which are optional.

4.1 Start-up

Following on from the company logo, the name and version of the unit and creation date of the firmware are displayed.




The device is then ready to use and changes to measurement display.

4.2 Display

Various modes are available for displaying the values. These can be enabled in the normal display (menu not open) with the help of the \triangleright - key.

- Two-row text display



Row 1: current measured value - flow rate/mass flow/flow velocity

Row 2: current quantity counter stand

- Three-row text display



Row 1: current measured value - flow rate/mass flow/flow velocity


Row 2: current temperature

Row 3: current quantity counter stand

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
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- Graphical display of flow values




Here the current value is displayed in the heading and the values over the last 10 seconds are displayed graphically. The data runs from right to left with the oldest value on the left edge of the graphic.

- Graphic display of temperature



Here the current temperature is displayed in the heading and temperature values measured over the last 10 seconds are displayed graphically. The data runs from right to left with the oldest value on the left edge of the graphic.

- Status



Row 1: status

Row 2: uptime (Laufzeit) of the device (in screen: devices is in operation for 0 days, 1 hour,

12 minutes, 53 seconds)

Row 3: time of the last issued pulse/limit related to the device runtime (in screen: 0 days,

1 hour, 11 minutes, 05 seconds after device start)

Row 4: time of the last request via M-Bus, related to the device runtime (in screen: 0 days,

0 hour, 2 minutes, 40 seconds after device start)

4.2.1 Error message


Should an error develop, either the corresponding error code (see chapter 7) or a description of the error is displayed. In this case, the error code is available under *Menu -> Device -> Info* as described in chapter 4.6.3.1.



4.3 Keypad lock

To prevent accidental inputs, the keypad lock can be activated when the menu is shutdown. To do this press the ▶ and OK keys simultaneously and hold for at least 3 seconds. A message is displayed to acknowledge the keypad lock. Repeat to disable lock mode.

A hardware solution for locking the keypad is also available. With the housing cover open there is an easily accessible board with the jumper "Keypad Lock" for deactivating the keys. When plugged in the keypad can be used, otherwise function is deactivated.



4.6.5 Basic settings

Menu -> Measurement settings -> Basic settings

4.6.5.1 Diameter

ID/mm: Input inside diameter di with the unit mm in a range from 0.1 mm - 9999.9 mm.

4.6.5.2 Profile factor

The profile factor PF specifies the ratio of mean flow velocity in the measuring section to flow velocity measured from the sensor. Requirements are centric positioning of the sensor, non-rotational inflow and adequately dimensioned input/output sections (see also Document U234).

Set the following profile factors subject to the inside pipe diameter:

For measuring in larger free jet as well as larger ducts or measuring tubes, PF = 1.000 results in the local/punctual velocity.



Profile factor for measuring tubes TA Di..., which are calibrated with pairs of values, must always be set at PF = 1.000!

4.6.5.3 Absolute pressure

Max. pressure/hPa: enter working pressure in hPa as absolute pressure for zero correction.

4.6.5.4 Damping

The damping set here has an impact on the measured value display and the value of the analog output.

Damping/s: enter the damping time from 01 to 99 seconds

Example 10 seconds: after every second the arithmetic average of the last 10 seconds is displayed.



4.6.6 Type of gas

Menu -> Measurement settings -> Type of gas

Display and change the media used and the associated value pair characteristics (see chapter 4.6.7).

Here, the operator can choose between various gases, enabling the sensor to be operated with different characteristics.

4.6.7 Characteristics

Menu -> Measurement settings -> Characteristics

Display and change with the gas characteristics linked to the medium.

4.6.7.1 Configuration

Quantity: enter the quantity of pairs of values (min. 2, max. 30) for processing and display (see chapter 4.6.7.2).

4.6.7.2 Pairs of values

Change the pairs of values characteristics, consisting of multiple pairs of values (to change the number, see chapter 4.6.7.1). A pair of values always consists of a velocity value in m/s and a frequency value in Hz.

Condition: the pairs of values must be ever increasing, i.e. the next velocity and frequency value must always be greater than the previous one.

Example for = 03

01:000.50 m/s, 06000Hz

02:010.00 m/s, 08350Hz

03:040.00 m/s, 12770Hz



If the frequency value is greater than in the last pair of values, then the velocity value is calculated by means of extrapolation. However, this means that the measurement uncertainty increases as this value is then outside the calibrated range.

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4.6.8 Standard conditions

Standard conditions for Höntzsch are 294.2 K (+21 °C / +70 °F) and 1014 hPa (14.7 psia). Any desired standard basis can be set using the following standard temperature and standard pressure parameters.


4.6.11 Pulse output

Menu -> Outputs -> Pulse output

The pulse output is an open-drain output that switches to GND and can be used as a limit value or pulse output.

The function of the digital output and the associated setting parameters can be parameterised via the display and the keyboard. The factory settings are documented in the parameter printout that is enclosed with the delivery documents.

Usage: The GND connection of the device is connected to the GND connection of the data acquisition. The open-drain output is connected to the input of the data acquisition, to which a pull-up resistor must be connected to the internal supply voltage of the data acquisition (with 24 V supply usually 5 ... 10 kOhm). The limit values for the digital output are: max. 20 mA / max. 32 VDC.

5 WiFi

The functionalities described in this chapter are for units fitted with a WiFi module, which is optional. When working via WiFi, you can use any internet-capable device to access the measuring device, control and transfer measurement data and change the device configuration.

5.1 Specification

Antenna: 2.15 dBi. Only replace an antenna with that of an identical type. Ensure a min 20 cm clearance between all persons and the antenna during operation.

Standard: IEEE 802.11b/g/n

Frequency: 2.4 GHz (2412~2472 MHz).

5.2 Initial operation

The WiFi module is to be setup directly after the device has been connected, as security demands that the pre-set password be changed soon.

During device initial operation, the device generates a self-sufficient wireless network with a SSID in the following form:



XXXXX is replaced by the serial number of the respective device.

Open the settings for the wireless network on your PC, Mac, smart phone, tablet or another internetcapable device and connect with the hotspot.

The pre-set password of the configuration access point is "U10b_SNRxxxxx" where xxxxx corresponds to the 5-digit serial number.

Once the connection has been established, start your browser and enter "u10b.com" or "192.168.0.1" in the browser address bar to reach the device configuration page. First select one of the available languages. You then come to the WiFi module configuration.



The following section explains the individual points:

Login and password:

Overwrite the login and the appendant password. This protects functions such as the alteration of device parameters and the resetting to factory settings against unauthorised access.

Password-protected parameters:

Here you can choose whether changing the flow sensor parameters should be password-protected.

Enable client mode:

Choose this option if the device is to be incorporated in an existing wireless network.

If this option has been selected, chapters 5.2.1 and 5.3.1.1 are irrelevant.



Enable access point:

Choose this option if the device is to generate a local hotspot.

If this option has been selected, chapters 5.2.2, 5.3.1.2 and 5.3.1.3 are irrelevant.

Access point PW:

Password protecting the access point, info access point and the configuration access point. Security demands that the password be changed during initial operations.

Use custom/fixed IP:

Select this option if you wish to awards a fixed IP address. When working in client mode, ensure that the selected IP matched the existing network and has not yet been issued.

Otherwise, when in client mode, the device will be assigned an IP address by the DHCP server of the existing network. The assigned IP address can be taken from a special info access point at a later point. You can also obtain the IP address via the router/DHCP server. In this case, the info access point is of no use.

Working in client mode, we recommend assigning the device a fixed IP address, so that the device can always be reached via the same IP address; thus for example, it is not necessary to dial in with a different IP address after loss of network (DHCP server dependent). The client mode without fixed IP is used to determine a valid IP address in the existing network. It is then possible to configure with a fixed IP with the IP address thus determined.

When "Activate access point" has been selected, you can use this option to assign the device with an address which deviates from "192.168.0.1".

TCP/UDP port:

Port selection for data exchange via TCP or UDP. See chapter 5.3.3 and 5.3.4.

Save settings:

If you do not wish to accept the changes you have made, load the page using the browser. Otherwise, click on "save settings".

5.2.1 Initial operation access point

With "Activate access point" selected, the saving of the settings leads to the display of a button for activation. Clicking on his button stops the configuration access point and the current access point / local hotspot is started.

5.2.2 Initial operation client mode

After selecting "Enable client mode" a key will appear after saving: this leads the user to the WiFi settings. Clicking on this button makes the device search for existing wireless networks. Renewed loading of the page enables this process to be repeated.

Select the desired wireless network / add a new network manually. After clicking on the "connect" button, the configuration access point will he held and the device will attempt to connect with the selected network. If this is not possible, the configuration access point will be restarted. A new connection attempt can be started with the reset button. If you have e.g. entered the incorrect password, you will need to repeat the previous steps.



5.3 Web interface

5.3.1 Accessing the web interface

5.3.1.1 Access point

The device generates a self-sufficient wireless network with a SSID of the following form:

XXXXX is replaced by the serial number of the respective device.

Open the settings for the wireless network on your PC, Mac, smart phone, tablet or another internet-capable device and connect with the hotspot. The password is that issued in the configuration access point. Once the connection has been established, start your browser and enter "u10b.com" or the IP address of the device in the browser address bar. The IP address is either the fixed address which you determined or the standard IP address "192.168.0.1". Successful entry results in the display of the web interface.

5.3.1.2 Client mode without fixed IP address

If the device has succeeded in connecting with the wireless network which you selected, it will generate an additional info access point with an SSID in the following form:

XXXXX is replaced by the serial number of the respective device.

If you are unable to ascertain the assigned IP address in a different fashion, open the settings for the wireless network on your internet-capable device and connect with this hotspot. The password is that issued in the configuration access point. Once the connection has been established, start your browser and enter "u10b.com" or the IP address "192.168.0.1". After successful entry, a screen is displayed containing the name of the wireless network connected with the device and the IP address. Copy or note the specified IP address. The info access point can also be deactivated at a later point; we recommend that you keep this active for the present.

Connect with the specified wireless network. Enter the IP address which you noted previously in your browser; the device web interface will be loaded.

The Info access point must not be ended. You can end it at any time via the separate Info access point or the web interface which has just opened. For this, consult chapter 5.3.2.4 sub-heading "Deactivating the info access point".

If you know the IP address assigned to the device, connect with the wireless network which you have selected from chapter 5.2.2. Enter the IP address in your browser; the device web interface will be loaded. In this case, the info access point is of no use and can be closed at any time. This is performed either via the access point or the web interface as described in chapter 5.3.2.4.

5.3.1.3 Client mode with fixed IP address


If the device has succeeded in connecting with the wireless network, open the wireless network settings on your PC, Mac, smartphone, tablet or other internet-capable device and connect with the wireless network selected in chapter 5.2.2.

Enter the fixed IP address in your browser; the device web interface will be loaded.



5.3.2 Operating the web interface

The following screen shows the device home page. The following section explains the individual links. Usable browsers are Mozilla Firefox, Google Chrome, Opera and Safari.



5.3.2.1 Info

Page with device information e.g. runtime, device status etc.

5.3.2.2 Measured value display

Visualisation of the measured values using three independently operable graphs. A graph displays the current volume flow, the mass flow or the current flow velocity. The second graph shows the temperature and the last graph shows the quantity counter. You can zoom within the individual graphs. Use the mouse to "click & drag" on a touch screen by pulling two fingers apart. Double-click on the respective graph to return to the standard view.

The screen also provides a measurement data export in CSV format.

5.3.2.3 Measured value display (relative time)

This type of measured value display is performed similarly to 5.3.2.2, but the measured values on the time axis are not labelled with the time, but are numbered sequentially. The screen also provides a measurement data export in CSV format.

5.3.2.4 Module settings

This page is used to change the WiFi module settings. The selectable options are explained here:

Refresh rate:

Setting the interval of the measured value update in the graphs of the measured value display. Values over 500 ms averages the measured values accordingly and can deviate from the values in the optional display.

Number of data points in graph:

The graphs of the measured value display start with the data recording when accessing the page. This option enables definition of the number of measured values in the graphs. When this limit has been reached, the old values are removed from the graph when new values are added. Too many data points can slow the browser speed.

Enable UDP broadcast:

To activate / deactivate the UDP broadcast. For further information regarding UDP broadcast, see chapter 5.3.3

Enable data exchange via TCP:

To activate / deactivate the TCP data exchange. For further information regarding TCP data exchange, see chapter 5.3.4

Disable info access point:

To deactivate the info access point. This option is only visible with an active info access point and can only be used for final deactivation.

5.3.2.5 Parameter setting part 1

This page is used to parametrise the device. The structure and function are similar to the display menu. For details regarding the individual parameters, see chapter 4.5 to 4.6.8

5.3.2.6 Parameter setting part 2 (pairs of values)

This page is used to enter the pairs of values of the gas currently set. For details see chapter 4.6.7.2

5.3.2.7 Sprache

This page is used to change the language settings.

The reset functions are password-protected. Enter the login selected during initial operation and the appendant password (see chapter 5.2).

Reset the quantity counter:

Resets the flow sensor quantity counter to zero.

Reset flow sensor to factory settings:

Resets the flow sensor to factory settings.

Reset WiFi module:

Resets the WiFi module. All network settings will be lost and the WiFi module must be setup again as described in chapter 5.2.

Reset all:

Resets the flow sensor to the factory settings and deletes the network settings of the WiFi module. The WiFi module must be setup again as described in chapter 5.2.

Please note: When accessing the information page, making changes to the WiFi module configuration or the flow sensor parameters and resetting all end the transmission of the current measurement data. This means that the measured value display, TCP data exchange and UDP broadcast are restricted at this point / are not available and may need to be restarted.



5.3.3 UDP broadcast

If UDP broadcast is activated (see chapter 5.3.2.4, "Activating the UDP broadcast" for activation) the device sends the measurement data to the IP in the form XXX.XXX.255 and the set port. As a result, you can receive from every device in the same IP range.




5.3.4 TCP data exchange

Communication with U10b measuring transducer via TCP/IP. The IP address and port number of the measuring transducer are required. These are variable and depend on the selected settings.

The U10b measuring transducer with integrated WiFi module answers the TCP package addressed to it. The data field must contain a valid 16 bit (2 byte) ID. Every ID stands for a function. TCP package to the measuring transducer:



TCO package from the measuring transducer (answer):



The response of the measuring transducer always contains the ID on which the device answers within the first 2 bytes. Depending on the ID, the response data sent from byte 3 has a varying length and different data type.

[&]quot;temp" is the current temperature of the medium in °C.

[&]quot;vol" is the current value of the quantity counter in Nm3.





5.3.5 Reset (hardware side)


The WiFi module password can be reset should it become lost. To do so, work with caution to open the housing cover (comply with the regulations for the ex area). Press the setup key for six seconds to reset (see image).



Then you can setup the device afresh as described in chapter 5.2.

The reset key has no influence on the settings performed and can e.g. be used to perform a restart or a repeated dialling attempt into an existing wireless network.

5.3.7 Switching on the module

6 Instruction manual for thermal flow sensor category 3G and 3D



Failure to comply with the specifications of the operating manual can result in an explosion.

6.1 Apparatus

Thermal flow sensors TA 10 and measuring tubes TA Di with integrated or separate evaluation unit

Intended use

The equipment listed as suitable for use in a potentially explosive atmosphere (3G and 3D) are sensors for the measuring of flow velocity, volume flow and temperature of gases. They are designed for use in area in which category 3G or category 3D apparatus is required.

When the equipment is operated normally within the limits of the technical specifications, excess temperatures, electric arcs and sparks are not probable.

Intrinsic heating does not need to be taken into account for category 3G; the maximum permissible additional surface temperature for 3D is 135 °C. Maximum media temperature: see type plate and the appendant technical documents.

The U10b evaluation electronics with the appendant sensors may not be used

- In areas in which category 1G or category 2G equipment is required
- In areas in which category 1D or category 2D equipment is required.



6.2 Safety Precautions (see chapter 1)

6.2.1 General

Hazard risks:

- modifications to the device by the customer
- handling the device outside the specified operating conditions
- handling the sensors outside the specified operating conditions
- improper use of the equipment

Danger when installing the sensors in pressurized pipelines:

- sensors for use in pressurized pipelines are to be inserted or retracted only in depressurized conditions;
 non-observance may result in serious harm to personnel
- when installing or removing under pressure, the appropriate protective equipment must be used, e.g. ball valve and probe guide pieces with chain guard or spindle probe guide pieces

The pipes for the measurement gases must be insolated in a way that is ensured that the electronics housing of the apparatus does not assume a higher temperature than the aforementioned maximum ambient temperature. The radiant heat and convection heat has to be considered also.

6.2.2 Use in potentially explosive atmospheres

Danger when use of the device in potentially explosive atmospheres:

- The flow sensors may only be used in areas specified for category 3G (zone 2) or category 3D (zone 22) apparatus.
- If severe variations in temperature are to be expected, the device should be left to adapt to the ambient temperature for at least one hour before use to avoid problems with condensation.
- The housing cover may only be opened and connection cables may only be connected or disconnected after the supply voltage has been disconnected.
- Instrument sensors with a separate evaluation unit may only be connected or disconnected when voltage-free. Protect the connection cables against opening.
- Before starting measurement in an explosive atmosphere, check whether the housing cover has been screwed down correctly.
- Mechanical shocks are to be avoided.
- Damaged instruments must not be used. This also applies to damage on the housing.
- Connection cables must be performed in AWG24 or stronger.
- The connection cable used must be approved for the temperature range of the evaluation electronics as
- Any covering of dust on the electronic housing may not exceed 5 mm.
- Only the manufacturer's cable glands ducts included in the scope of delivery or permitted, identical cable glands may be used.
- For devices with M-Bus option, make sure that the bus lines are limited to a maximum voltage of 44 V against ground and equipotential bonding system.

Category 3G and category 3D apparatus listed in chapter 6.1 is to be used solely in areas in which the ambient temperature range **for the electronic housing** does not exceed -25 to +60 °C. The display and keypad are not permitted in category 3G or category 3D explosive areas.

Category 3G and category 3D apparatus listed in chapter 6.1 is to be used solely in areas with the temperatures marked on the type plate for the measuring medium and ambient atmosphere and for the maximum permissible overpressure.

The additional maximum surface temperature in the category 3D areas amounts to 135 °C. Maximum media temperature: see type plate and the appendant technical documents.

6.4 Installation

The current European Specifications for Assembly, the recognised standards of good practice and this Instruction Manual apply.

We recommend a cable with a 1.5 ... 6 mm² cross section for connection to the earth terminal. Use a cable lug.

The earth terminal must be tightened with a torque of 2 ... 3 Nm.

Use connection cables which have been cleared for a temperature range of -25 ... +80 °C.



6.5 Maintenance

Maintenance work on the equipment is to be carried out solely by Höntzsch GmbH & Co. KG.
